LITTLE STEPS—

THE NEW TACADE PROGRAMME EXPLAINED

Never let it be said that Lions are not in touch with the young people of today, for this year sees the launch of the Tacade programme designed for children in Reception class, i.e. 3–5 year olds.

This Tacade project, which has aptly been named "Little Steps" is an early learning years resource for teachers promoting personal and emotional development for 3-5 year olds.

It concentrates on life skills much needed by children, such as communications, peer pressure, bullying and how to cope with life in an ever changing world. This Tacade resource, which has been worked on jointly with the Education Department provides teachers with the support and training, giving them materials at their disposal to help assess and nurture the needs of a child. It will help bridge the gap between teachers, their parents and most importantly the children.

It was Harpenden Lions Club that first realised the need for such a project, devised under the Tacade umbrella, for use in schools across Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire. They set about raising the needed £20,000, since each pack (nearly 400 in all if all the schools take it up) cost £60 each, with the rest of the money being spent on training the teachers. The schools cannot take part unless the teachers are trained.

So far to date, 9 clubs in the district have pledged donations, with some money coming from other sources, such as companies and individual donors. There is still a short-fall of approximately £2,500. The bottom line is this: if the rest of the money cannot be found, a number of schools will not be able to take part.

It is difficult to assess just how the children will benefit. In fact, the proof of how successful this is, will not be apparent until the 3–5 year olds of today, become the adults of tomorrow. If it is successful, and Tacade is starting to have a track record for its other projects, then in 15 years time, there will be our children or grandchildren sitting in on a Lions Club meeting somewhere in the District, advocating an updated "Little Steps" project like this one. The question is: Can we take the chance not giving the children a headstart in life? I hope your answer was "no".

ONEWALK—AN EPIC JOURNEY

Have you ever been in a situation when talking about it just isn't enough anymore? We now have a chance to do something.

On Tuesday 22nd of June, Lions from all over 105A are being encouraged to take part in accompanying an extraordinary man, Chris Moon, on part of his epic journey of 1,284 miles (John O'Groats to Land's End). Our bit will be just 7 miles, in case you are wondering. Chris Moon, together with our help, is on target to raise **£1 million** for Leonard Cheshire Homes, an organisation dedicated to create opportunities for disabled people.

Chris himself, a former soldier, lost his right arm and leg, clearing land mines for the United Nations in Mozambique in 1995.

He thought it was incredibly important to visit London, which has added a further 300 miles, just by making this detour. In a recent interview in the Daily Telegraph, he said, and I quote, "For me this walk is about showing people that you can achieve amazing things in disadvantaged circumstances." Isn't our slogan "ordinary people, amazing things"?

Our part of the walk will start in Lords Cricket Ground, meeting between 11-11.15am and will end in Westminster, seven miles later. Along the way, there will be time for refreshments, and a t-shirt and goody bag will be provided.

MESSAGE IN A BOTTLE: A FURTHER PERSPECTIVE

I was interested to read the article about "Message in a Bottle" by Lion Vijay Jain of London Central Lions Club (May 2004) and congratulate the club on its work in this field.

However, I was a little puzzled by his question of "Yet how many (clubs) have taken up the gauntlet?" Puzzled because the answer is: nearly every club in Bedfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Hertfordshire and Oxfordshire. In addition clubs such as Redbridge, Enfield and Northwood and others are all on board.

The Message in a Bottle scheme has been running for over 4 years within our District but it was only at the Bournemouth MD Convention that it was adopted as a Multiple District project. This was not for the want of trying on the part of your officers though. PDG Ram Jaggi, DG Elliot Shubert and myself raised the issue at Council of Governors on several occasions and we were delighted when the resolution proposed by Northwood Lions was finally submitted and agreed this year.

It is difficult to estimate, but at a conservative guess is that over 100,000 bottles have been dispatched throughout District 105A. There is also a huge level of expertise within this District built up over a number of years and the following very dedicated Lions can all help in advising on the best way to launch the project. Lions Roger Woburn (Biggleswade Sandy), Alistair Robertson (Bedford Harpur), Martin Morgan (Bletchley Milton Keynes), Les Westley (Leighton Buzzard), Maddy Radburn (Carterton), Gordon Acaster (Amersham & Chesham), and Doreen Carr (Redbridge), who brought the scheme into this District.

Other references which record club involvement and further explain the scheme can be found in DG's Newsletter throughout 2002, from Lions and Clubs such as Lions Monica Sage (Stevenage Coreys Mill), Doreen Carr, Mike Baldwin and Ram Jaggi.

I hope this article will help to expand even further this important scheme and I am delighted London Central are also spreading the word in a positive way.

Note from Ed: perhaps we should look at publicity outside the Lions family. As District PRO for the forthcoming year, I would welcome interested parties getting together to formulate and carry out a larger PR plan.

MODEL LIONS CLUB MEETING

After visiting 89 Lions and one Lioness Club during my year, I have acquired many impressions of what makes a good club meeting. Here are my views of the positive elements that make a meeting enjoyable, fun and informative.

- A bright and cheery welcome by the President with an appropriate joke, quotation or "thought for the day".
- Toasts to "The Queen", your club, and LCI. Keep formalities to a minimum (what's wrong with using first names?).
- An Agenda; club regalia displayed; a comfortable room separate from the public, chairs arranged theatre style or a table organised into a square or u-shaped.
- Apologies, minutes distributed and approved (not read to the members), one Code of Ethic and one Object read out loud by all Club members; condolences for any unwell members, immediate family, a national and/or international tragedy
- Officer and Committee Reports kept to the bare minimum, primarily as updates. Secretary should pass around all correspondence received. Break out for individual committees to meet for 15-20 minutes or committees meet half hour before club meeting, then a brief report to the club when reassembled. Keep it to the point. Explain briefly the committee's reason for the proposal. If you respect the committee's work then less discussion will be needed before voting.
- Rotas for service or fundraisers passed around for sign up rather than discussed during the meeting.
- Avoid allowing a member(s) to dominate the discussion. The more viewpoints that are heard, the more interesting the meeting.
- Break after 50-60 minutes first with taitwisting, then drinks and comfort break.
- A presentation by a local or national organisation, District Officer, DG, etc.
- Discuss at least one aspect of the club each month, such as how goals for membership growth are progressing, how fund raising activities are working, problems/successes with service activities, concerns about club in general (could be preceded by all members completing a questionnaire anonymously), etc.
- After AOB, end on a high note with a funny story, appropriate joke, inspiring quote, taitwisting, etc. All members should leave the meeting in a good mood. If this can be achieved, the members will look forward to their next meeting.
