WORLD SIGHT DAY MARKED AT BRENT CROSS!

On World Sight Day, 14th October 2004, the Lions of 105A took up position at the Brent Cross Shopping Centre and provided the shoppers the opportunity to get their eyes tested on the amazing Heidelberg Retina Angiograph (HRAII)" machine and to show the public how ordinary lions are doing amazing things.

World Sight Day is an annual event focusing on the problem of global blindness; it aims to raise public awareness around the world about the prevention and treatment of loss of vision.

In the United Kingdom the major causes of registerable blindness are diabetic retinopathy in the working age population and age-related macular degeneration in the elderly. The current imaging system for the retina gives images on film, which subsequently requires developing prior to analysis, however a new machine called the Retina "Heidelberg Angiograph (HRAII)" uses a video capture system, which allows the initial results to be available immediately, so that subsequent treatment plans can be formulated in the shortest possible time thus reducing waiting lists. With the help of Lions clubs of Hadley wood, Chipping Barnet, and an LCIF grant among others, the first HRAII machine in this country has been introduced at the Barnet Hospital Eye Unit.





Beware: You could be vulnerable!

Whilst one would not refer to Lions as being vulnerable, we might well end up in a position where our actions could be criticised, so it is just as well to remind ourselves of how we can protect ourselves and our clubs. PDG John Smith, the District Vulnerable Persons Officer offers the following topical advice:

Father Christmas

There is no reason why this should not continue provided safeguards are applied. Usually parents or carers are present.

- Lions Club members must <u>never</u> be left alone with children.
- If parents or carers are not present encourage another trusted adult to be present at <u>all</u> times
- It is perfectly acceptable to sit on Santa's lap providing these safeguards are in place.

Christmas Lunch and Similar events. These should continue with safeguards:

- Lifts. Where possible two people should assist (Form VP2 FOR REGU-LAR TRIPS)
- Meals. Dietary needs and allergies should be considered. Tickets should briefly highlight these points. (Form VP1 to be completed only if above applies).

The advice from the MD and our District is that if you have any member dealing with vulnerable people on a regular basis, they should obtain a basic CRB check, this can be done by sending a list of names to the District Vulnerable Persons Officer, PDG John.E.Smith, who will send you the form.

Environmental Photo Contest

Lions Clubs International is introducing an exciting new program called the Lions Environmental Photo Contest. The annual photo contest is intended to provide a way for Lions to portray, through an original photo, their pride and commitment to improving, protecting and preserving an aspect of the environment in which they live.

The contest is open to all Lions and Lions clubs in good standing. Lions wishing to enter the contest should submit an original photo that

depicts the environment where they live in *one* of the following five categories:

- Landscapes (urban or natural)
- Animal Life
- Plant Life
 - Weather Phenomena

This year's theme is "Sharing our World". Each photo submission should include a title, the negative, and a 25-word (or less) description of the photo and why the environment being depicted should be improved, protected or preserved

The photos have to be submitted to the DG by 1 January 2005 but I may extend this deadline. The multiple district will then conduct its own contest to select one winning photo to be submitted to Lions Clubs International by 1 March 2005. Winning photos will be displayed at the Lions international convention and judged by convention registrants for the categories indicated and for "Best of Show." Winners are to be selected on originality, artistic merit and portrayal of environmental themes. Photographs must be original, unaltered in any way, and have been taken solely for the purpose of this contest. Photos depicting people will be disgualified. Lions Clubs International reserves the right to reject photos not meeting contest criteria. Submitted photos shall become property of Lions Clubs International. Lions Clubs
